The 41st Annual Gas & Steam Show was held on July 13th and 14th. Over 725 people came out to enjoy sawmill, threshing and shingling demonstrations, sweet corn steamed by the Westinghouse, tractor games, and a parade on both days. Thanks to Kerri Steward, Judith Kidder, Barb Howard, Lois Bremer, Carol Foley, John Foley, and Carissa White for their help in the village, and thanks to all of the Gas & Steam club members for making the event such a success!!

The Civil War Muster on July 21st and 22nd was another hot one but 664 visitors and 550 re-enactors defied the heat to make the event a success. Visitors browsed Sutler's Row, talked to the re-enactors at their camps, listened to Abe Lincoln speak in the Church, watched a fashion show on the front porch of the Upjohn House, learned about Civil War-era beauty practices and bullet cartridge-making in the

Bristol Inn, watched an artillery demonstration down by the river, watched battles both at High Meadows (Saturday morning) and in the village (both days), joined in a barn dance Saturday evening, and

walked through the re-enactor camps and village by candlelight. Thanks to all of the re-enactors and village volunteers – the Iszler family, Seif family, Ann & Alexis Replogle, Jeff Van Nortwick, Jack Boarts, Dave Chase, Laura McBeth, Jamie Bowman, Dan Harrow, John Merrick, and Troy Bass for bringing to life this part of our nation's history.

The June 23rd and July 28th Yard Sales were attended by 60 vendors and several hundred community members. The Michigan Fiddlers Jamboree entertained the crowd with live music at the June sale. In July, the Antique Outboard Motor show delighted boating enthusiasts at the Recreation area. John Barany held a carving demonstration at both sales, helping attendees hone their carving skills. August Fest on August 18th featured a yard sale with 30 vendors plus an antique car show with 39 vehicles exhibited. Those programs bring our total for the year to 45 programs serving 2335 students and adults. Thanks again to everyone for all of their help for the Spring/Summer education season, we really appreciate it.

Charlton Park's "Tree-rific" program for No Family Left Indoors on July 24th was well attended. 23 children and adults joined Shannon and Marie for a hike on one of the trails behind the village to learn about some of the Park's trees, and then met in the Village to enjoy root beer floats (root beer donated by the Walldorff Brewpub & Bistro) and explore the village.

Also, Jack Boarts, Dave Chase, and Roberta Meeker assisted Marie Morgan with her inventory of the clothing collection. Thanks to everyone's efforts, close to 15,000 artifacts have been entered into the database!
