OPERATIONS UPDATE

Grounds clean-up around the Park was completed after the leaves finally decided to fall. The boat dock was pulled out of the water in the recreation



area in anticipation of snow and ice. At the conclusion of the "Of Christmas Past" event, work was done to winterize the village buildings in preparation for

the colder months ahead. We have also started projects for 2018, including ensuring all Park tools and equipment are in working order, taking inventory of the picnic tables and repairing them as needed, and making sure the main drive into the Park is clear of ice and snow.

O'NEIL JAMES "JIM" NEWKIRK

We were extremely sad to hear of O'Neil James "Jim" Newkirk's passing on December 7, 2017, at the age of 70. Jim was a re-enactor with Battery D, 1st Michigan Light Artillery, its commander



since 1980. The Battery D, 1st Michigan Light Artillery group participates in the Civil War Muster at the Park every year, and Jim was on the committee for the event for a long time. In his later years, he could be seen during the High Meadows battle scenarios explaining to spectators what

exactly was happening. He had a wealth of knowledge and was always willing to share. Outside of the Civil War event, Jim also assisted with collections projects and public programs at the Park. He helped us to identify some of the guns in our collection, and he (along with the rest of Battery D) gave a presentation about the role of artillery in battle (photo). He will be greatly missed.
